The Association of Library Service to Children, the national authority on childhood literacy, has developed a Summer Reading List for children under five years of age. Play has a direct link to early literacy experiences.










KING JACK AND THE DRAGON ACTIVITY



- **1. ASK QUESTIONS.** Ask your child, "Where do you think dragons live?", "What color are dragons?", "What do dragons eat?".
- 2. PREPARE FOR PLAY. Prior to reading 'King Jack and the Dragon' place three bricks in front of your child and then place or hide five bricks around the room.
- **3. READ.** Read 'King Jack and the Dragon' once all the way through allowing your young listener to explore the story and ask questions.
- **4. READ AGAIN & BUILD.** Next, read the story a second time and then start a hunt around the room to find the hidden "power" bricks. Ready to battle the dragons? Click bricks together to build the ultimate sword of bravery.
- **5. BUILD MORE.** Encourage free time building to personalize the story. Ask your little one to build her own dragon out of DUPLO bricks. Does it have a red head? Five feet? A spiked tail?



Did you know?

Research shows that it's best to let children experience the story uninterrupted by questions the first time through so that they don't lose the flow (and enjoyment) of the story.
